It's been a while since our last communication so it's definitely time to provide an update of our activities for 2018 in the Upper Dolpo region of Nepal.

Although our main fundraising period is November to March each year, we are grateful to receive donations at any time.







Our goal for 2019 is ambitious at \$40,000. For 2018, we raised slightly more than our goal of \$30,000 thanks to many kind and generous donors. For 2019, we hope to support the schools at Komas and Saldang at levels similar to 2018 but Karang will require more support, as they are losing their interim support. We also hope to provide several of their graduating students with scholarships to continue their education beyond grade 5. Pema Gojor Gurung, the school coordinator for Karang, has been working tirelessly to find funding for a hostel in Kathmandu and to qualify his students for discounted school fees at the Tibetan exile school where Altitude Project currently supports Tenzin Norbu.







School Reports:

- ➤ Saldang 82 students attending this year. Leaking school roofs are still a problem and we need to raise funds for repairs. And of extreme importance is to develop a good plan as to how to install a more permanent fix to the problem. Heavy rainfall was once unknown in this high altitude desert but damaging rainfall is becoming more frequent and the traditional roof construction in the Dolpo is no longer adequate for the school. A full component of teachers is in place and all is well on that side of things.
- ➤ Komas 25 students are attending this year. The toilet block that Altitude Project funded is now constructed and in use! Komas is the smallest village in the region with a population of 200 people.
- ➤ Karang 62 students attending this year; school infrastructure is in good condition; full complement of teachers in place and things are going well.
- ➤ Ku 30 students attending. We will learn more about this school in December. We provided a small one-time grant of \$1,500 for the 2018 school year.
- Approximately 200 students in school this year thanks to all kind sponsors!







Toilet Block at Komas:

The <u>toilet block project</u> at the school was completed early in the season by local villagers. This project was desperately needed and we are pleased that it was done so early! Cost was \$1,500.



Solar Lights:

- ➤ 125 solar lights by LuminAID were provided to villagers
- A checklist of recipients has been kept along with a photo of each person receiving their light (we won't see photos until Dec)
- ➤ These lights are extremely popular and very useful we hope to provide more lights in 2019
- LuminAID provides lights at a healthy discount for charities and we are grateful for their support








Yak Girl – Dorje Dolma coming to Nelson! – read more about her book on our website

- And we will be traveling to the Upper Dolpo in the fall of 2019 Saldang School will be having its 20th anniversary!
